This past year Hospice Quinte held several seminars covering the topic of Advance Care Planning (ACP). According to Hospice Palliative Care Ontario, Advance Care Planning is a process of reflection and communication. It is a time for you to reflect on your values and wishes, and to let people know what kind of health and personal care you would want in the future if you were unable to speak for yourself.

It's important for people to consider planning for such an event early, so in the event something does happen that makes it impossible for you to make decisions regarding your healthcare, you are still set up to get the care you desire.

In January 2023, Hospice Quinte received \$24,000 in funding from Ontario's 'Seniors Community Grant' program. As a result of this funding, we were able to provide 11 ACP presentations to 263 people through both virtual and in-person lessons. The seminars were for seniors 55 and over to explain how to develop an Advance Care Plan.

A recent study found that advance care planning conversations were associated with more days spent at home at end-of-life, as well as higher patient satisfaction and less financial strain on the hospital system. As well, an article from the Globe and Mail found that only about 15 per cent of Canadians die at home, despite polls that consistently show that is the preference of about 85 per cent of the population.

These stats and the popularity of our ACP seminars show just how important it is that people consider creating an Advance Care Plan, and sooner rather than later.

Services at the SKCC

Hospice Quinte understands that those who are facing end-of-life, and their loved ones, need support. We can care for people in the last three months of life at the Stan Klemencic Care Centre.

The Care Centre features six suites for people requiring end-of-life care. Residents are supported 24/7 by a specialized team of nurses and personal support workers, assisted by physicians, volunteers, and a variety of other staff. A wide range of equipment is available in the facility to ensure safe and comfortable care is provided during these special moments. The hospice facility is designed to accommodate smudging ceremonies, meal preparations, family meetings, and more. There is no cost to the services provided.

Anyone can inquire about hospice residence services. Admission is coordinated through Home and Community Care Support Services South East.

THE COMFORT OF HOME CAMPAIGN

With less than half of the funding received by Hospice Quinte coming from governments of all levels, we rely on the generosity of the community to keep the organization running. That's where our annual Comfort of Home Campaign comes in.

The annual initiative was put in place to assist Hospice Quinte in garnering the necessary funding to support its world-class hospice palliative services, including the renowned Stan Klemencic Care Centre, at no cost to clients or their families. The goal of the Comfort of Home Campaign is to raise enough money to cover our operating budget for the upcoming fiscal year.

Last year, the campaign was successful in raising over <u>\$835,000</u> dollars for the first year!

The 2nd annual Comfort of Home campaign is designed to assist the organization in meeting the ever-growing need for its services here in the Quinte region.

The 2023-2024 campaign goal is \$1,000,000, which is the amount required to meet Hospice Quinte's \$2.2M operating budget this year. We are confident that with the help and support of our generous community, we will be able to


